
Intro to UK Greens


There are 3 Green parties in the UK:

- Green Party of Northern Ireland (leader: Steven Agnew, MLA)
- Scottish Green Party (co-conveners: cllr Maggie Chapman, Partick Harvie MSP)
- Green Party of England and Wales (leader, Natalie Bennett)

Quick history

- Founded in the 1970s
- First Parliamentarians: 1999 Holyrood & EU.
- First MP 2010
- Big surge in 1989, 15% of Euro vote but no seats
- Desolate 90s
- First Westminster MP, 2010 (Caroline Lucas).


- Oct 2014: Greens excluded from debates


